



Prince August is pleased to present its new **Seven Years War** series of moulds. Working in close collaboration with wargamers and experts on the period, we have produced a range of moulds whose flexibility is such that many troop types and variants can now be produced. This new system features much more detailed and accurate figures than ever before with heads, bodies and other accessories produced separately. We have already released Prussian, Austrian, Austrian-Hungarian, French, Russian and British Highland infantry moulds as well as Artillery, Cuirassier, Dragoons and Hussars moulds. Now we are releasing our British 51st Regiment moulds for this series. This consists of three moulds. Series was designed by Prince August and Steve Metheringham.

The 51st regiment was raised in 1757 in the north of England, and was stationed on the continent the year after. In 1759 at the start of the Seven years war it was part of the main allied army under the Duke of Brunswick. In August that year it took part in the battle of Minden, where the British infantry successfully repulsed the French cavalry and forced them to retire. It took part in other battles during the next two years, namely Corbach, Clostercamp, and Vellinghausen.

One of the tricorns in the mould has a rose next to the bow on the left side. Infantry, though not grenadiers, were wont to attach a rose in this manner to celebrate their famous victory over the French at the battle of Minden.

The officer is provided with three different poses, to make a variety of poses.
